

DO NOT MISS A DEADLINE

Remember in high school when the English teacher said the term paper was due on Friday? Remember when the teacher would give an extra day (or two) if vou were sick or missed school? This will not happen with your injury claim. With an Ohio injury case, there are no extensions. No excuses. Ever! Either the case is filed on time, or the claim is

Ohio, like other states, has established a deadline, or "statute of limitation," which sets forth when an injury claim must be filed. Depending on the circumstances and the type of claim being presented, the deadline might be just one or two years. If the claim is not filed within the deadline, the claim is lost. A judge does not have the power to extend the deadline even if there is a very good reason the claim was not filed on time.

If a person wishes to assert a claim for injuries sustained as a result of a car accident occurring in Ohio, that claim, generally speaking, must be filed within two years of the date of the motor vehicle accident. This deadline is established in Ohio Rev. Code §2305.10. Thus, if the motor vehicle accident happened on January 10, 2021, the suit must be filed by January 10, 2023, or the claim cannot go forward. There are actually circumstances where the deadline can be less than two years. It can be difficult and confusing to determine the precise deadlines that apply to an injury case. The consequences of misunderstanding the deadline can result in a complete forfeiture of all rights to recovery. Pork Tenderloin Marinade

Warm sunny days are finally upon us and so is grilling season! This pork tenderloin recipe is one handed down to me from my mom, and while I have tried other marinades, I always go back to this one! Everyone loves this and it is probably one that I have copied and shared more than any other! The key is to grill it-don't bake it in the oven. It's just not as good that way. Fire up the grill and enjoy!

1/2 cup of oil

1/3 cup of soy sauce

1/4 cup red wine vinegar

3 Tbsp lemon juice

2 Tbsp worcestershire sauce

1 Tbsp dry mustard

1 1/2 tsp black pepper

1 1/2 - 2 lb pork tenderloin



Instructions

Mix all ingredients, pour into resealable plastic bag, and add pork. Coat with marinade, squeeze out excess air, and seal the bag. Marinate in refrigerator at least 4 hours or overnight.

Preheat grill for medium heat and lightly oil the grate. Remove pork from the marinade, and shake off excess. Discard the remaining marinade. Cook the pork tenderloins on preheated grill until no longer pink in the center, about 15 to 20 minutes, turning occasionally. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read at least 145 degrees F (63 degrees C).



WORDS: THEIR MEANINGS, USAGE, AND HISTORY

The word "clue" comes to us from Greek Mythology. In Greek Mythology, "clew" means a ball of yarn. In a famous Greek myth, Ariadne gave Theceus a ball of yarn to find his way out of Minotaur's Maze. Ariadne laid this yarn down as he was walking through the maze to help him find his way out. Theceus unraveled the varn behind him as he went into the maze, so that he could follow it when he wanted to walk out of the maze. Because of this the word "clew" came to mean something that "points the way". Thus, the word clue can be understood in the context of a detective or fact finder working his way backwards to solve a crime using "clues".
