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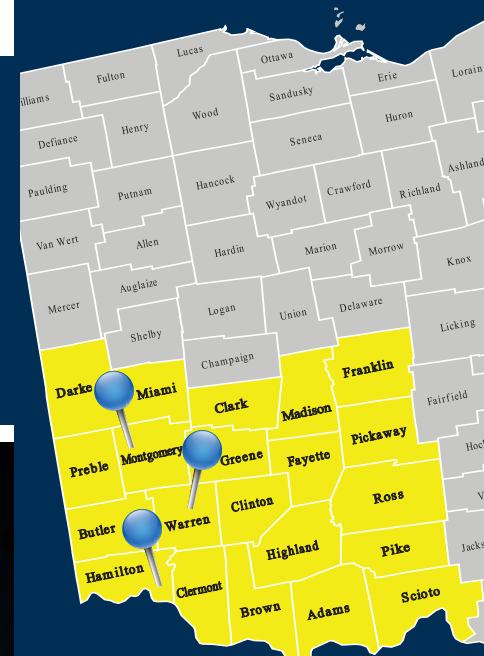

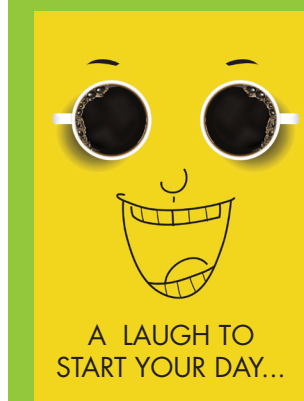


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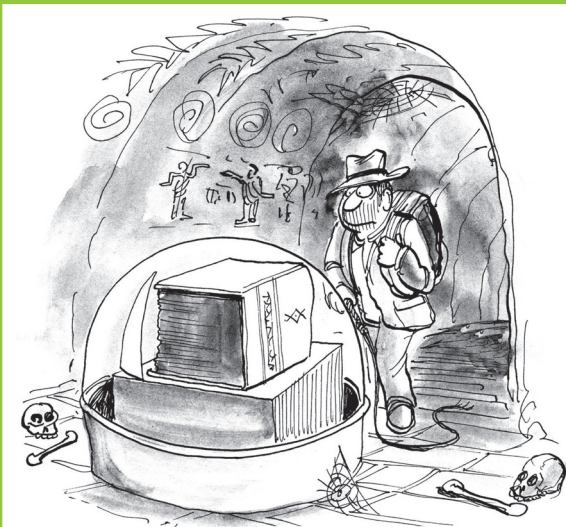

DID YOU KNOW?

The Jury Cannot Be Told the Defendant Has Insurance

If your injury case cannot be settled out of court and proceeds to a jury trial, the jury will not be told that the defendant has automobile insurance coverage. In the courtroom, the negligent driver will be seated at the defense table with the lawyer hired by the insurance company. But the jury is not allowed to be told that the lawyer has been hired by the insurance company. If you or your attorney mention that the defendant has insurance, the judge

will probably declare a mistrial, requiring the trial to be restarted with a new jury. The judge might impose sanctions on your attorney.

The prohibition against discussing liability insurance is governed by Ohio Evidence Rule 411, which provides, "Evidence that a person was or was not insured against liability is not admissible upon the issue whether he acted negligently or otherwise wrongfully."

Delicious Easter Brunch Recipe - Blintz Soufflé

I have had this wonderful brunch recipe for a number of years, and I think it is so good! I believe it originally came from a Bed & Breakfast somewhere in southern Ohio. If anyone knows, please do share!

8 T. unsalted butter, softened
1/3 C. sugar
6 eggs
1/2 C. sour cream
1/2 C. orange juice
1 C. flour
2 tsp. baking powder

FILLING
8 oz. cream cheese
1 C. ricotta cheese
1 C. cottage cheese
2 egg yolks
2 T. sugar
1 tsp. vanilla

STRAWBERRY SAUCE
1 lb. strawberries cleaned,
hulled and sliced
1/3 C. sugar
1 T. fresh lemon juice

Combine in saucepan & cook over medium heat. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Reduce heat & simmer for 20 minutes. Let it cool to room temperature. Sauce will thicken as it cools. Serve atop the warm soufflé.



Preheat oven to 350° F. Butter a 9x13 inch pan. Make batter: In a bowl, beat the butter, sugar, eggs, sour cream, orange juice, flour, and baking powder until smooth. Pour half of the batter into the greased pan.

In a separate bowl for the filling, cream the cream cheese, then mix in the ricotta, cottage cheese, egg yolks, sugar, and vanilla. Drop this mixture by spoonfuls over the batter and gently spread it over the surface. Pour the remaining batter over the filling. Bake for 50-60 minutes or until golden.

Top with fresh cut fruit of choice, (strawberries, blueberries, peaches, or your favorite combination) or a sauce like the one above.

“VACCINE”

We all know that the word “vaccine” has been in the news a lot lately. Depending upon your political persuasions and other factors, the Covid vaccine is either considered a technological marvel or some sort of government intrusion. But where does the word “vaccine” originate? Let me explain. In 1796, there was a looming threat from smallpox. The particular manifestation of the 1796 smallpox virus existed among cows. Cows are known scientifically as “variola vaccinae.” This comes from the Latin word “vaccinia,” which is an adjective referring to anything related to cows. Edward Jenner, an English doctor and researcher, discovered that a group of women who milked cows contracted a mild version of the virus, so he decided to run an experiment by taking a sample of the wounds of the workers to intentionally infect an 8-year-old boy. Six months later this boy was exposed to human smallpox and he proved to be immunized.

Around 1800 the smallpox vaccine was embraced by all of Europe marking one of the greatest advances in modern medicine and the understandings of the immune system. From this event with smallpox in cows came our current use of the word vaccine.
